

Message from the President:

Hello Everyone,

I hope everyone had a good month and got to do lots of turning.

Our July meeting was our annual wood shopping event and picnic was an event to remember. If you missed it, you missed a really good time. We went to The Hardwood Store in Gibsonville and got some really good deals on wood. They were sort of overwhelmed because they didn't expect so many people to come. I guess they didn't realize how we like to get bargains. Then the rain came and came and came. We were lucky that most of the rain had quit by the time we got to the shelter at Lake McIntosh. **Jim & Rita and a lot of the ladies worked hard to get our picnic set up for us. Let's all be sure to show them our appreciation. While we were busy shopping for wood, they were out at the lake working to get everything set up for us and trying to stay dry.** We weren't able to do any of the lake activities due to a light rain, but we stayed dry under the shelter. Earl Kennedy and John Morris both did informal demos for us. Earl did a goblet with an offset stem and John turned a segmented bowl. Woodworkers Supply and The Hardwood Store donated items for our raffle. If you patronize these stores, be sure to thank them for their donations and support. Lan was gracious enough to bring about 20 bowl blanks for the raffle and the club donated numerous items to the raffle. There were enough items in the raffle that everybody, including spouses, won something. We had barbeque and hotdogs to eat and a bunch of great deserts and other dishes. Thanks to everyone who bought food and helped set up the picnic.

In August our demonstrator will be Ricky Minor. He will be teaching us about Air Brushing and using colors in our turnings. Ricky has taught Air Brush classes for Alamance Community College



for the past 20+ years and is very experienced in many areas of painting and art. We are lucky to have Ricky to explain how to use air brushing to enhance our turnings. If you have an airbrush and want to learn to use it better or are thinking of getting one and want to know what it is all about, this is the demo for you.

Then, on Tuesday evening, August 17th he will be leading a break-out session at the Leonard Rec. Center from 6:30 to 9:30. We have 20 people signed up so far. There will \$10 charge for this breakout session, payable in advance or at the door to help defray some of Ricky's expenses since he is not a club member and will be coming from out of town.

We are working on having Linda Michaels lead a breakout session on Saturday morning, September 11th on pyrography. If you attend this session, you will need to have your own woodburning tools. This does not include a propane torch or matches. We are still working on ironing out the details. We will send out an email to all the people who signed up for the session telling you what you need to bring. We have all seen Linda's work which is outstanding. We can all learn a lot from her. Linda teaches woodburning classes professionally so there will be a small charge of \$10 for this session.

We are working on scheduling the Mini-hat Breakout session with Jerry Measimer, our demonstrator from March. We will probably move that back to October or November. We haven't set a specific date but it will be an all day breakout session and will probably be held in Jim Duxbury's shop in Graham. There will be a small charge for this breakout session to help defray some of Jerry's expenses since he is not a club member and will be coming from out of town.

Please bring your **two** best tunings for display in the Instant Gallery and one item for each of the Monthly Turning Challenges. Limiting your entries to **two** items for the Instant Gallery and one item for each of the Turning Challenges gives us more time to admire them. We have a really fantastic Instant Gallery so let's all keep up the good work. No matter what your level of experience everyone can and should participate. If you are a new turner, don't be intimidated by the pieces that more experienced turners have put in the gallery and/or turning challenge. The Instant Gallery and Turning Challenge are meant to be a good source for new ideas for things to turn. Everyone should participate. This is your time to show your stuff. You can also ask other members to critique your work if you wish. Due to time constraints, critiques will not be part of the meeting but can be done either before the meeting, during the break or after the meeting on an individual basis.

Our turning challenge for the August meeting will be something that you have enhanced with color, either dye or paint. It can be anything you chose to turn, be it a platter, a hollow form, a bowl, a box, a Christmas ornament or whatever. The choice is yours. Let's show Ricky what we can do. We didn't have but 3 people turn something for the turning challenge for last month, probably due to the picnic. Let's try and have better participation in the months going forward.

Our turning challenge for September will be to turn a thin bowl, no smaller than 8" and no thicker 1/4". It can be out of one piece of wood, plywood or segmented, whichever you chose.

If you would be interested in participating in doing a collaborative turning project for the AAW 25th Symposium, please be thinking about something that we could turn as a group and we will discuss it at the August meeting. Wood Turning Design Opportunities:

Recently I was turning a 23" bowl from a maple block I received from Jan and Fred Brown. I noticed something extremely concerning. I had to carry 26 loads of 40 gallon shavings to the compost pile. This was way too much work and very wasteful. Woodturning sure does create a lot of shavings!

In my back yard, I keep a running compost pile. I add shavings to one end of the pile and remove composted gold for other end. Just what the garden needed. This method worked great until about two years ago. I bought a bigger lathe. As you can imagine, my projects began getting bigger as well. I am now adding shavings to the pile at a mountainous rate. I have wood compost for everyone's garden. The second block I received from the Browns was even bigger. It was nearly 30" across and 34" long. My normal method would have yielded 2 big bowls and a lot of shavings. I sat down with pencil and paper and started doing some Jethro Ciphering.

Turns out, if I planned this properly I could get a whole lot more from a block of wood. This is probably published in a book somewhere, but I have not found it yet!

After watching Bill Grumbine's video, I received my first inspiration. He does not cut a block through the pith; he cuts on either side of the pith. The light bulbs started going off everywhere! If I were to cut about 1-1/2" on either side of the pith, I could then split out several 3"x3" spindle blanks. That is exactly what I need to make scoops. I only wasted the actual pith. It was 3"x3"x28" and made an excellent stick of firewood for this winter, instead of becoming compost.

So I look at the 2 log halves I have left and go huh!!! These are still too big for my lathe. Wait a minute; I have been turning platters lately. Starring me right in the face is a giant platter blank from each half of the log. You guessed it, a straight cut about 2-1/2" in and I have 2 beautiful platter blanks ready to be sealed for drying. But that is not all. When I cut off the corners, each blank has 4 pieces big enough to make Christmas ornaments.

Now each half of the log is still big enough to yield an 18" bowl. Thanks to the use of a recently purchased McNaughton coring tool. I also have a 15" bowl and a 12" bowl and a 9" bowl and a small piece left over that fits in the firewood pile nicely.

So let's review what we generated from one block of wood measuring 30"x34".

- 8- Bowls from 9" to 18"
- 2- 24"x24" platter blanks
- 8- Christmas ornament blanks
- 6- 3"x3"x28" spindle blanks

Actually I cut the spindle blanks in thirds so I have 18 scoop blanks.

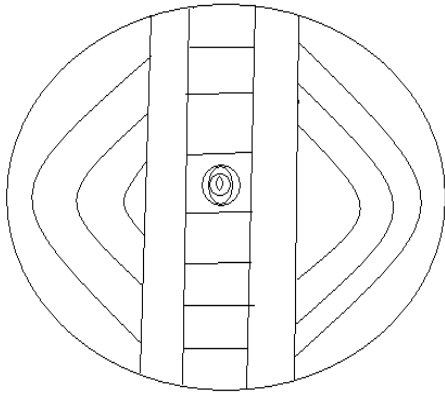


Figure 1. Cross Section of the log showing the cuts.

From one block of wood, I now have my next 42 turning projects. (See Figure 1)

Oh and I only created 2 cans full of shavings.

FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro To Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.
 At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.
 Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.
 Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.
 As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.
 Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro
 Take Exit 212 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.
 Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.
 Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.
 As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come the intersection of Ballinger Rd.
 Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM THE NORTH SIDE OF GREENSBORO

Ballinger turns west from New Garden / Guilford College Rd. just north of Guilford College. The following link to Mapquest will detail this area.
