An announcement was made regarding the club's annual picnic. There were 3 guests at this meeting who were recognized and welcomed. George Sudermann made an announcement regarding the purple heart pens project. Bob Muir made an announcement regarding the kids summer camp endeavor. Given Jim's absence, there was no announcement regarding the president's challenge. Of course, given the picnic, the next president's challenge will be at the August meeting and will, no doubt, have something to do with the letter "A". The treasurer's report was shared with the group. I then showed a pair of glasses that were given to me prior to the meeting. They were covered in CA glue splatters. The safety story was that these were luckily being worn by someone who accidentally grabbed the wrong bottle of liquid to apply to a spinning piece. It was bad enough, but had it not

been for these glasses, the situation would have been far more tragic. Word to the wise, safety equipment really does pay off, but only if you actually use it. An announcement was made regarding a workshop at the Reedsville site. Finally, Mike Thompson indicated that he had a number of large burls that he would be distributing to members in the near future, so check with him if you are interested. After the instant gallery, a break, and our monthly raffle, Michael Hosaluk was introduced. He began by showing us a series of photos of his projects over the years. He invited us to visit his web site for more:

<http://www.michaelhosaluk.com/>. The main theme that I noticed was the high degree of experimentation and artistic sensibility that was present in his work and in his approach to woodworking. He has no problem working with paint over unremarkable wood. He also used a wide variety of materials. This very impressive collection earned him a deserved round of applause from the audience.



He then told us about the challenges of being a production turner and he illustrated this by turning out a large spinning top. [Later in the evening, me made good on his boast that he could turn a top from scratch before another spun top would topple over. Nice trick.]



He then moved on to his main project of the evening. He was going to turn a small ladle. His ability to turn a sphere was really pretty impressive.



But then he cut a jam chuck to hold that sphere and it fit well enough even though he did not make any measurements. All of this was done by eye. Clearly, he has years of experience doing this sort of thing. He made sure that the handle of the ladle would clear the ways. The handle was tilted toward

the tail stock and then he hollowed out the ball. He mentioned that he uses a 4:1 :: bees wax to mineral oil mixture as a finish to most of his turnings.



LRC Summer Kids Program:

The 10th annual woodturning classes for kids participating in the Leonard Recreation Center's summer camp were completed with the 5th session on Wednesday, August 1. Attendance varied a little from 12 to 17, all neat kids. They made magic wands, ice cream scoops, slim line pens, "egg" clocks, whistles, tops, weed pots, and ring stands. All wore the smocks that Martha Hunter made three years ago.

The instructors were Bob Blanchard, Jerry Jones, Jay Mullins, John Moehlmann, Tim Smith, Doc Green, Bob Muir, and Jim Yarbrough, Jim has served for all 10 years!

The 8 lathes were furnished by the club (4), Jim Barbour, Jim Yarbrough, John Moehlmann, and Doc Green.

Classes will probably begin on Wednesday June, 26, skip the week of July 4, and end on July 31, but that must be worked out with the Center Director. All the projects only involve spindle turning and nothing real fancy. **If you can turn, you can show these kids how to do these simple projects**
