The memorial features a 60 foot Obelisk in the center and also includes approximately 130 tons of granite from Mount Airy. The rest of the stairs, pavers and other monuments account for another 260 tons of granite. It is definitely something worth seeing while you are at the park.

Notes from our Secretary:

Noteworthy announcements included:

- The library collection of VHS tapes are being converted to DVD's. As they become available, the VHS tapes are being offered in the monthly raffle.
- The annual AAW meeting is scheduled for June 13-15 in Phoenix.
- The annual picnic will be held again this year at Triad Park Shelter #1 on Saturday July 12th. The shelter will be available to us from 9am till 6pm. This year, several people will be offering demos at the picnic.
- 2014 PTWA Christmas Party will be held at the Pioneer Family Restaurant in Archdale on Tuesday December 9th at 6:00.
- Linda Marsh (the director of the Leonard Center) dropped by to say hello. She complemented us all on our commitment not only to art but to the process of production of art and the community spirit that our club embodies.
- The President's challenge this month is to turn a pen.
- Jerry Jones was this month's "Turner of the Month." Floyd Lucas will be "Turner of the Month" in June.
- John Morris is organizing the Summer Turner Camp for Kids. If you are interested in helping, contact John. We are planning several new projects for this year.
- Michael Thompson briefly described a problem that he had while turning a piece that had too much of a bark inclusion. When the bark inclusion goes all the way through, the piece can explode apart.
- We have approximately \$3,200 in the treasury.

After a break and the monthly raffle, Phil Fuentes demonstrated several off-axis turning projects.

The majority of Phil's presentation involved showing us how to make eccentric boxes. Phil

concluded his presentation with a quick demonstration of how to turn a spoon. It was clear that many people could not stay for the final part of this demonstration. If you had to leave early, Phil has posted this YouTube video

[<http://youtu.be/Tw5kxyB1XVg>] that shows what you missed. While some of the pieces that he had on display could be done with a standard 4-jaw chuck, some of the pieces required the use of a special eccentric chuck. The particular chuck that Phil uses is a Vicmarc Escoulen.

Phil started by tilting a blank 15 mm off center. He then rounded off 3 inches near the tail stock. This would become the "box" at the top of the piece. After adding a tenon, he parted off the lid. Using a separate chuck, Phil hollowed out and gave the lid its initial shape. He then jam fitted the lid on the body of the box. He cut it to its final shape and thickness. Setting the lid aside, Phil then went on to hollow out and finish the inside of the box. He then cut a cove under the bottom of the box. After a final cut, he sanded it



slightly. Then, in order to induce not only an eccentric cut, but a spiral effect, Phil rotated the piece 15 degrees in the chuck. Using a standard spindle gouge, Phil then shaped a thin layer. He then again rotated the piece 15 degrees and cut another layer. After a third layer, Phil ran out of room, so he returned the piece back to the zero point. Then, using the ball joint of his chuck to go eccentric, Phil finished the base and parted off the piece with a saw.

To turn the spoon, Phil began by turning a tenon on a piece of stock. He then placed the piece way off center in a standard chuck. The key is to make sure that all four jaws are grabbing some wood. Once in place, you need to make sure that your tool rest does not come into contact with the wood. Then you turn what will be the handle of the



spoon. You will work down through a lot of air until you get to a thin handle. You will also need to work towards an arc across what will be the top of the spoon. Once that is all sanded, return the piece to its original axis. The handle will be flying around. Remove the tail stock and set your tool rest perpendicular to your ways. Make sure that the handle clears the tool rest and then—while extending the tool way over the end of the tool rest—go inside the rotating handle to hollow out the spoon. Once you have the internal shape that you desire, move the tool rest to the side and shape the bottom of the spoon. Part off and sand.

These were truly amazing pieces and an amazing process to watch. Phil was an excellent demonstrator. His explanations were clear and his passion for his work was easy for everyone to see. I was particularly impressed with Phil's tool work. Even when reaching well over the tool rest, his cuts were always right on target. It was instructive to see the fluid rotations and elevations adjustments that Phil made with his tools. I would say that Phil's tool work was an art in itself. This was an all around excellent demo which was deeply appreciated by everyone.

FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro To Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.

At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro

Take Exit 212 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM THE NORTH SIDE OF GREENSBORO Note: *Ballinger Rd. is now open.* Ballinger turns west from New Garden / Guilford College Rd. just north of Guilford College. The following link to Mapquest will detail this area. Directions from Bus-40 to Guilford College Rd have been removed since the above directions are much faster from Bus-40.
