I was able to head south at the end of June for the AAW Symposium in Tampa. This was my first time attending a national woodturning symposium. Despite the fact that the attendance (around 1,200 people) was down from 2012 in San Jose, there was still an amazing collection of woodturning talent on display at the Tampa Convention Center. Walking through the instant gallery area was a truly humbling experience. With all of the carvings and embellishments that some pieces had, I found myself wondering what part of the piece had actually been turned on the lathe. It was definitely a chance to see some things that you never would locally.

In addition to perusing the instant gallery and seeing some great demonstrations I attended the chapters meeting. The chapters meeting is where the chapter presidents get together with the AAW board of directors. We got a chance to hear from and ask questions to the board about various chapter concerns. One of the hot topics was about the chapter insurance issue that arose earlier this year. Another thing that some chapters are looking into is virtual demonstrations. This is in the very early stages and a lot of things need to be worked out, but basically the way a virtual demonstration would work is that a video and audio link would be established between a demonstrator (in their own shop) and the club. The main purpose for doing this would be to cut down on the cost of "seeing" some professional demonstrators that may otherwise be cost prohibitive for clubs. One of the ideas was to make these demonstrations available to more than one club through a webcast. As you can imagine there are a lot of technical and legal details that still need to be ironed out before this becomes a reality. The meeting also provided a chance to speak to other clubs about what they are doing for fundraising, meeting places, etc.

I also attended the banquet and auction on Saturday night. The food was good and it was nice

to meet and chat with new people. Although I didn't come home with any of the items from the auction, it was a very fun night.

The 2014 Symposium is set to be held in Phoenix, AZ on June 13<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup>. The 2015 Symposium is still up in the air at this point. If you get a chance to attend one of these, I highly recommend it. It is an experience that you will not soon forget.

**FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO**

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro To Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.

At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

**FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO**

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro

Take Exit 212 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

**FROM THE NORTH SIDE OF GREENSBORO** *Note: Ballinger Rd. is temporarily closed between Guilford College Rd and Leonard Rec.Ctr.*

Ballinger turns west from New Garden / Guilford College Rd. just north of Guilford College. The following link to Mapquest will detail this area.
