Minutes from the April meeting

PTWA—Minutes for April 9, 2024 (taken by Nim Batchelor)

The meeting was called to order at 6:30. This was the first meeting under the presidency of Greg Ford. So, he took a few minutes to tell us a bit about his past. He mentioned that he retired in 2023, that he is a scout leader, and has 6 kids and 4 grandkids. He thanked the prior leadership group for their service and for leaving the club in good condition.

Visitors were acknowledged and a count of Greensboro residents was taken. 11 Greensboro residents out of a total of 24 members present.

It was mentioned that our club is a 501(c) (3) organization and thus any donations to the club would be tax deductible.

Ken Sunderland volunteered to be turner of the month for May and Bob Moffett volunteered for the month of June.

The president's challenge for May is to "turn a flower or something flower related."

We were told that the update for the website should be live soon.

Bob Muir reminded us that we once ran a summer program for kids to learn about turning during the summer months. We need someone to step up to be the coordinator of that program for this summer. In addition, we need folks who are willing to show up to be instructors for the program. This program meets once a week, spanning 6 weeks (excluding the week of July 4th). It is for kids 9 and up.

This month's president's challenge was to "turn an egg." Those items were shown off. Bob Moffett told us about his bird house, which was the turner of the month contribution for this month.

The instant gallery was presented.

We were reminded about the offer of pamphlets pertaining to classes on offer from the John C. Campbell school.

Given that we only had two items, it was agreed that we would hold an auction rather than conduct a full raffle.

Lan Brady then started his presentation on "Multi-axis turning." He pointed out the virtues of: spraying your ways with WD-40 before you begin, of filing your tool rest, and of cleaning out the head and tail stock openings.

His plan was to show us how to make a "water scoop", which is a favorite item for those who do early American reenactment.

Bob Muir reminded us that Barbara Dill wrote a book on multi-axis turning and he advised anyone who wanted more details and ideas to consult her book.

Lan then rounded the stock and marked it into thirds. On the third nearest the headstock, he rounded it off into a ball shape. He reminded us that we need to sand as we go along, because once you change an axis, it is difficult to sand the item thereafter. He applied a finish to the ball that was 2 to 1 candle wax (or bee's wax) to mineral oil.

He then moved the pointy part of the tail stock to an offset point about a half-inch off center. This was the start of the multi-axis part. He then turned the handle of the "water scoop." He did this in a

way that the middle of the handle was the appropriate thickness, but also so that there was a bit of a knob at the end. Sand and finish.

He then mounted the ball into a gripper (see photo). He used a forstner bit to drill out a hole. Next, he hollowed out the ball, being careful not to (1) bust through the wall, (2) not to cut away the handle and (3) not to get his hands anywhere near the handle that was flying around rather quickly.

The device that he used to hold the ball was a version of a "cole jaw." He had long screws that went into the holes on the face of a normal chuck. The screws had rubber on them. Worked a charm.

The presentation was quite a success. Much skill and ingenuity was displayed, and everyone learned a few things. As expected, a wonderful presentation.

FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro to Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.

At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro

Take Exit 212 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about 1/4 mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.
