Minutes of the September Meeting:

We began the night with a tool sale. There was a variety of items available. I saw a buck of experienced turning tools for 5 dollars apiece. There was plenty of sandpaper packets. A small compressor was available for adoption. Several pieces of wood appeared as well.

Our demo this month was the complete buffet. We set up for small groups and allowed everyone to visit whatever they were interested in.

We began the tour of the room with the all important sharpening. Three different means of sharpening were set up. Jim Terry was there with his grinders using both Tormek and shop made jigs for the different gouges. He also included a station for Buffing. He brought a variety of woods to experiment with. Some pieces with finish applied and others were unfinished. Each station was doing an outstanding job. Quite a few gouges were reshaped and many were sharpened and honed as needed.

Next we move to the lathes:

Earl was giving lessons on 2 piece Christmas ornaments. I hope all got a chance to see this, it is a great skill to add to your own arsenal of turnings.

That Brady guy was demonstrating his home made hollowing rig. It was made from off the shelf Lowes parts and a little welding.

At the last lathe, Jim Barbour was demonstrating how to use a Skew. And before you ask, he was not opening paint cans with it! The Skew was making some very fine finish cuts to a spindle. These pieces did not need sanding after turning.

Sitting quietly in the back of the room was Linda Michael. She was demonstrating the art of Pyrography. She has become a master at burning finite lines in wood and making it look like a masterpiece. I especially like the texturing techniques she has perfected. If you walked up , you were no longer a spectator but a participant. Several people left that night, saying, "I gotta get me one of those things!"

In order for our AAW liability insurance to cover these demonstrations, we will have to restrict demonstrating to only those who are current members of AAW.

We can have exhibit space, but I don't know how much right now. I told the lady that, if we exhibited turnings, we would want them to be secure.

Her first request was to begin demonstrations every-hour-on-the-hour. My feeling is that each demonstration should be pretty short, 10 - 15 minutes. Items that take longer could be shown with examples of successive stages with the actual turning showing just one or two of the stages.

I can think of several formats:

1. We could have one lathe and one demonstration each hour letting different people do the demos, or

2. We could have several lathes going at once, but begin each hour with a very short introduction to turning along with safety instructions.

They have a nice 3-sided shelter outdoors that could accommodate 2 or 3 lathes. This would allow more of the children (and parents) to get closer to the lathe. Yes, weather could be an issue. Demos can be done inside.



FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro To Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.

At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro

Take Exit 24B (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.

Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.

Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.

As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.

Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM THE NORTH SIDE OF GREENSBORO
