into the completed vase and then rotates it around to coat the inside. It works like a charm. He mounted a blank, being careful to think about which grain and features that he wanted for the bottom and top part of the vase. Tonight, he is using a maple blank for the demo.

He turned a tenon on the tailstock end, then reversed it. Chucked it in and then rounded off the blank. He then gave the bottom half of the vase its basic shape. He wants the thickest part of the vase bottom to be at about ½ the full height of the vase. He disdained measurements and suggested that he simply turned until he found a pleasant shape. He then gave that shape its final cuts. He achieved a smooth surface by using an extremely light touch with a negative rake scraper.

Then with a 1 and ½ forstner bit, he drilled a hole to the appropriate depth inside the vase. His hollowing tool consisted of a hardened steel tip that was CA glued or set screw attached to the end of a thick steel rod. He used a steady rest arm that had a laser pointer over the tip.



He shaped the flute and then hollowed out the vase.

He suggested that would finish the piece with 3 coats of waterlox (24 hours drying and a rubbing with steel wool between coats). And then a final buffing with Renaissance wax.
