PTWA Minutes Aug.12, 2025

We started at 6:30 with Greg Ford presiding. Ted Beesley (336) 202-254, announced to the group that he is selling his entire shop. He has all kinds of tools and wood for sale. Contact him for details.

Bob offered a bucket of oak chips for the taking and asked questions regarding routing a piece of oak and questions about how to measure a space to know how much epoxy to mix. It was suggested that he tape around the void and then pour in rice or lead shot. Then simply measure the volume of rice. It would be a near approximation of the volume of the void.

There were 38 people present. Greg thanked Crystal for having taken over president's duties last month. Greg mentioned that tonight's demonstrator would be Ed Siegel. Ed will be showing us how to turn a 3 cornered bowl.

As for the future schedule: In September, Earl Martin will demo some Christmas tree ornaments. In October, John Johnston will be with us. He will also be doing Christmas themed turnings. 
Greg mentioned that the National AAW was held in Minnesota. It got good reviews from those who were familiar with the event. It was suggested that registration for next year's National AAW event in Raleigh is already open and available on-line. (I couldn't find it though).

The North Carolina Woodturning Symposium is coming up on Nov. 7-9. Here is the website for that event—https://www.ncwts.com/. You can register already. Please make an effort to attend. This is always such a great learning opportunity.

Given that our club is the host club, we need volunteers. First, we need volunteers to help move equipment to and from our room in the venue. Secondly, we need volunteers to host visiting demonstrators. Contact Greg if you are able to volunteer in either or both of these ways.

There was no treasurer's report this month. We did the instant gallery, had a break, and then did the raffle. During the instant gallery, someone recommended Rubio Monocoat (https://www.rubiomonocoatusa.com/). He said that, while it is expensive, it is well worth the results.

Ed Siegel was then introduced and he began his demo. He showed us an example of a 4 cornered bowl that is turned from a traditionally mounted blank. The novelty with a 3 cornered bowl is that you don't use a chuck. You start with a CUBE. You the squeeze two points of that cube between the hole in the headstock and the hole in the live center on your tail stock.








Before you begin cutting, you should spin the piece around (1) to make sure that it does not contact the tool rest, and (2) to make sure that the 3 vertices that are nearest to the headstock are equidistant from the tool rest. If they are, then you can be reasonably sure that you cube is mounted appropriately. You should then turn (1) the outer shape of your bowl, and (2) place a tenon that you can use when you reverse the piece. You need to insure that your tenon is 90 degrees so as to insure a solid grip.





After you have reversed the piece, you can start at the tip and work your way down until you have a bowl. Small increments is good. Work into the wood—not out—so as to avoid chipout. Do the air-wood-air thing for a while. You can use a negative rake scrapper to finish the bottom of the piece. It was mentioned that Stewart Batty has a youTube video explaining his approach to grinding and using a negative rake scrapper. You might also want to watch this video (https://youtu.be/uZ5kqiT3FE0?feature=shared) from Cindy Drozda.
