PTWA Minutes

Jan. 13, 2026

President Greg Ford presiding. We started the meeting at 6:30. Greg asked for visitors to introduce themselves. Four people did so and were welcomed by the group. There were 43 people in attendance.

Taylor Jones' talk, which was scheduled for tonight, was cancelled and will be rescheduled later in the Spring. Ed Siegel graciously agreed to step in at a moment's notice to do a demo for us tonight.

Last month, we held the annual holiday meal/gift exchange event. Although, not exceptionally well attended, everyone had a great time.

Next month, we will be reprising our tool skills event. There will be 6-7 stations operating simultaneously. You can get instruction and hands-on experience with the skills being taught. There will be no instant gallery and no raffle during this event.

The president's challenge for March will be to turn a bowl, following upon tonight's demonstration.

The "turner of the month" for this month is Dave MacInnes. Dave has turned and decorated a small three pointed bowl.

Now is the time to register for the AAW National Symposium, which is coming June 7-9. It is being held in Raleigh this year. You can get a discount on your registration until Feb. 28th, by using the code "PTWA2026".

One of our members brought in some blocks of foam, that can be shaped into an effective jam chuck. It was offered for free.

Thanks were offered to all who participated and supported the recent symposium in Greensboro. It was genuinely appreciated as a wonderful experience.

During the instant gallery, Steve Coley mentioned (1) that the tool handles that he had in the instant gallery were purchased through the Carter and Son's site (<https://carterandsontoolworks.com/collections/aluminum-handles>); and (2) that his Instagram account has photos of the bowl that he is showing this evening. #cedarbreezewoodwork on Instagram. Really interesting and instructive site. Give it a look.

After the raffle, Ed Siegel began his demo pertaining to an "ogee bowl". An "ogee" is a shape that is constructed from a convex and a concave curve blended together.



Ed began by mounting a blank on a screw chuck and then rounding off the outside edge. He then cut an 1/8 inch deep recess that would accommodate his expansion chuck. He used a flat and square scraper to insure a 90 degree inner wall on the recess and a flat surface abutting that 90 degree recess. He then marked off about a 3/4 inch space for the foot of the bowl.



This foot needs to be wide enough so that it does not crack with the pressure from the expansion chuck. He then roughly divided the space between the outer edge of the bowl to the outer edge of the foot into 3 equal sections. He then turned his tool rest to 45 degrees relative to the face and cut away the outer two-thirds of the marked off area with a cove cut. Next, he roughly drew a line that marked half the distance between the outer edge of the bowl and the outer edge of the foot. He then turned a

“bead” on the inner side of this division. He blended this into the prior cove cut and—there you have it—an ogee shape.

He then reversed the bowl and mounted with his expansion chuck. It is here that you decide on the extent of the rim that you want to work with. You can go without any rim or you can give yourself several inches of space to decorate. Tonight, Ed decided on about 2 inches of space.

Ed decided on a two-bead rim, so he cut down the area between the two beads. In that area, he gave it a bit of a convexity for character. He then very skillfully turned a bead on the outer edge and then a second bead further in. Ed suggested that it is nice to allow just a bit of flat space inside the inner bead before the concavity of the bowl proper begins.

He said that he usually sands to 240 grit and then uses multiple passes with Black Yorkshire paste. When wiped with paper towels and nothing else comes off, then you know that all the Yorkshire paste has been removed. It was suggested that if you want to ensure that all the wax is removed, Naphtha will do the trick.
